### **Basketball and Church**

I was watching the first-round basketball game of a local high school conference tournament. I could not help but to notice the body language of both the losing team and their coach. Furthermore, because I sat right behind the team's bench, I was able to hear some of the conversations between players and between players and coach. I was close enough to the game itself that I was able to hear comments made by players on the court. And it was clear that the weaker of the two teams was not putting forth their best effort.

The coach was friendly with his players. He laughed with his players as his team went down by 10 points and then 20 points and then 30 points. I would have preferred the coach of the losing team, and the players on the losing team, to exhibit a bit of passion, enthusiasm, and desire to, at least, make the game respectable. I even heard one player say, "I don't want to dribble!"

As the church of Jesus the Christ, it often appears that we too are overmatched. For those of us who love the church, for those of us who have been moved to action by the message of Jesus' cross, for those of us who have centered our lives around the activity of the church, it is sad to see a day when fewer and fewer people choose to participate in the life of the church with regularity. I had someone say to me recently, "I remember FBC Ahoskie in the 1970s when you had to wiggle a bit to find a place in a pew for Sunday morning worship." For those energized and encouraged by high levels of church participation, it is disappointing that we no longer need to wiggle. Of course, this is not unique to our church. During his visit with us last weekend, Paul Baxley told me that churches are smaller wherever he goes.

So, what do we do? Well, we do not lose heart like the overmatched basketball team and coach. We simply cannot refuse to dribble. It is imperative that we continue to compel people to turn from their sin to new life in Christ. There is a reason our churches are smaller – many people are lost and without an awareness God in their life. How sad indeed!

I was encouraged after our worship experience together last Sunday, February 2. We all heard an excellent sermon from Paul reminding us of our total dependency on God. And we had new faces in some of our otherwise empty spaces. Of late, I have exhorted our congregation to reach out and to invite others to visit with us. I know that some, perhaps many, of our people have done just that. It showed last Sunday! Please keep inviting people to be a part of our community.

As the secularization of our society deepens, we, as the church, often feel overmatched. However, we must continue to evangelize with passion, enthusiasm, and desire. We must continue to share the message that God was in Christ reconciling the word to himself (2 Corinthians 5:19).

#### From the Associate Pastor

What does the LORD require of you? To do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.

-Micah 6:8

The Children's Time that we provide each Sunday as part of our worship service is one of my favorite. The world needs us to be more kind to one anothmoments of the week. I enjoy the challenge of coming up with age-appropriate ways to communicate complex theological teachings to young children. I love the way our children freely participate in the discussion, even when their contributions move us far off topic!

Last Sunday the children enthusiastically stayed on topic as we talked about kindness and what it looks like. I loved it when four-year-old Lila Stuart Pierce chimed in with her description of kindness. "It's when you have good manners . . . and you don't hit."

Since Sunday, Stuart's description has been running through my mind quite a bit. My first thought is this: Though many of us could probably use a manners check-up, I think most of us are pretty good about saying "Please" and "Thank you," "Yes, ma'am," or "No, ma'am," and "Yes, sir," or "No, sir." We hold the door open for others. And we try to be helpful.

But what about hitting? That's my second thought. Of course, I hope to goodness none of us are physically hitting others. But it occurs to me that there are other ways of "hitting" someone, and unfortunately, many of us are too readily engaging in those other ways.



When we purposely embarrass someone, that's a type of "hit," When we disparage someone because his/her politics are different from ours, that's a type of "hit." When we use social media to attack those

persons or organizations we perceive as "other" other races, other religions, other nationalities, other cultures — that's a type of "hit." When our thoughts are too filled with an "us vs them," or "I vs you" mentality, those thoughts lead to speech and actions that are a type of "hit." And these type of "hits" need to stop.

er." (Ephesians 4:32) We need to take Stuart's definition of kindness and Micah's directive from God, and pray that God's Holy Spirit will help us live them out each day.
