Easter Baptism Anyone?

It was common practice in some geographical areas for early Christians to observe baptism on Easter Sunday. For example, when discussing the many ways in which churches in different places observe Easter, Socrates (a fifth-century church historian) states that in Thessaly (Greece), the Christians there baptize only during the days of Easter (presumably late Saturday night or Easter day). This practice caused some concern because, due to their custom of baptizing only once a year, some died before they received baptism people (Ecclesiastical History 5.22). Siricius, bishop of Rome from 384-399, was opposed to baptism on Christmas, Epiphany, as well as the feasts days for martyrs and apostles. Rather, Siricius favored baptism on Pentecost or Easter Sunday. Interestingly, Cyril, bishop of Jerusalem from 350-387, informs us that those prepared for baptism during Lent were baptized in the nude on Easter eve or Easter Sunday. Furthermore, upon exiting the waters, the newly baptized were clothed in a white robe. Perhaps, as Anita suggested recently, there is a connection between the white robe and, in our day and time, new dress clothes for Easter. For all you ever wanted to know about baptism among early Christians, see Everett Ferguson's Baptism in the Early Church: History, Theology, and Liturgy in the First Five Centuries (Michigan and Cambridge, 2009).

This Easter will by my fourth Easter as your pastor. Each of the three previous years we have baptized on Easter Sunday. In 2017, we baptized Steven Hollingsworth. In 2018, we baptized Camille Pierce and Fletcher Pierce. In 2019, we baptized Miracle Deloatch. Naturally then a 2020 Easter baptism is in order.

Of course, there is no bad time to baptize. I would have to dig a bit to find the exact date of my baptism. However, I remember very well that it was not on Easter Sunday. Rather, my baptism was in Bill Sweet's pond on a hot summer evening. Nonetheless, there is indeed something profound about baptism on Easter Sunday.

Hear Paul's words in Romans 6:3-5: "Or do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus have been baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him through baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have become united with him in the likeness of his death, certainly we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection" (NAS-UE).

Baptism is rich with imagery. When we are immersed under the water, it is symbolic of our death to sin. Jesus died *for* sin. We die *to* sin. Therefore, we are untied with Jesus in his death. When we come out of the water we are united with Jesus in his resurrection. Jesus was raised to new life as validation of his identity as the Messiah, the Christ. We too are raised. We are raised to newness of life, to live a life dedicated to obedience to Jesus' teachings.
