#### The Bible

I started reading the Bible in 1989. I was a new Christian. And I knew that I knew almost nothing about the Bible. At the time I could not have identified Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John as the first four books of the New Testament, much less told you that the word "gospel" means good news. Someone somewhere suggested that I begin with reading Mark's gospel – the shortest of the four gospels. So, I read Mark's gospel. When I finished Mark's gospel, I thought, "I should read Mark again." So, I did. And then I read Mark yet again. Once I sensed that I had Mark's presentation of Jesus in my head (and, hopefully, my heart), I moved on to Matthew's gospel. I read Matthew through several times. Then I read Luke's gospel through several times. Then I read John's gospel through several times. Once I sensed that I had a grasp on the New Testament gospels, I moved on to Paul's letters. After spending considerable time with Paul, I moved on to the remaining New Testament documents. And eventually, I got to the Old Testament. I continue to read from the Bible daily.

I have been engaged in a love affair with the Bible for 31 years now. In fact, I was so fascinated with the biblical text that I decided to pursue advanced degrees as an avenue to understand it better. Though my PhD is in patristics (early Christian writings that emerged soon after the New Testament documents), I have two master's degrees that focus on the New Testament and Christian origins. I can work with the original languages of the Bible – Hebrew, Aramaic (there is a small amount of Aramaic in the Old Testament), and, of course, Greek. In relation to early Christian literature then, the Bible is my first love.

As with most love affairs, this one has had its ups and downs. I have struggled with the reality that this book I love was written long ago in a world far different than mine. What does it mean, I have asked through the years, that we do not have any of the originals of the documents in the Bible? That is, we do not have the actual letter that Paul wrote to the Romans. What we have are copies and copies of copies of Paul's letter to the Romans. And no two copies are exactly the same. And this same dynamic applies to all 66 books of the Protestant Bible. The last sentence leads to another intriguing quesdoes itthat tion: what mean Catholics. Protestants, and Greek Orthodox Christians have different books in their Bibles? Furthermore, I have spent much time wrestling with issues of sexuality and gender as they relate to the ancient texts found in our Bible. Finally, what are the implications of our conviction that the Scriptures are inspired and of more authority than any other text or body of texts? These questions and more have perplexed me to varying degrees through the years.

Questions and all, the Bible saved my faith. I have shared with you about my dark year and a half of the soul. During this time, I considered abandoning Christianity all together. Thank God for the apostle Paul. During these dark days, I looked closely at what Paul claims. He claims that God raised Jesus from the dead and that through Jesus' death we are put into right relationship with God. Paul claims that over 500 people saw the resurrected Christ in addition to the apostles. Paul claims that many of those 500 people were still alive in his day. These are incredible historical claims. Either Paul is right. or he is wrong. I decided and thank God I did, or our paths would never have crossed, that Paul was right. I have Jesus deep in my bones due to my reading of the Gospels and Paul. So deep that, even during dark days, I was able to

hold on. And I have not looked back since I exited that dark valley. Case closed – settled! Thanks be to God for *all* the writings, with *all* their complexity, found in the Bible.

In light of my above comments about the Bible (Old and New Testaments) and out of obedience to my calling as a minister of the gospel of Jesus the Christ, I feel compelled to share with you that it causes me great pain when a public figure explicitly, and unabashedly, uses the Bible for selfish gain.
