What I Like

I admit it. Every day around our church offices feels like Christmas because of our sanctuary renovations. In fact, when there is a break in work as we say goodbye to one construction crew and await the arrival of another, I feel disappointment. I like all the activity, all the noise, and all the progress. Indeed, one of the employee benefits has been such proximity to our sanctuary renovations. I still get to breath the holy air (even if dusty at times) in our sanctuary daily.

I also enjoy giving tours of the sanctuary as people stop by for various reasons. I wish I had kept count of how often I have heard this: "To be honest, I was not sure about a blue ceiling, but it is just beautiful." Indeed, as Anita and I have pointed out to numerous people, the color of the walls and the ceiling accent the primary colors in the stained-glass windows. I find

satisfying the comments from people who have stepped in the sanctuary, as well the comments generated from pictures posted on our church Facebook page, about the beauty of the refinished floors. I agree. And now that the pews are back in the sanctuary, though not properly placed and secured just yet, we are able to appreciate the stateliness of this eighty-plus year-old refinished furniture. Furthermore, the pews in the balcony give the sanctuary a more refined look than it had before.

What I like most about our sanctuary renovations, however, as we near completion, is the simplicity of our work. We have done nothing fancy. We replaced old, stained, and in some cases falling ceiling tiles, with drywall – painted a light shade of blue. We fixed numerous cracks in our sanctuary walls and

then painted the walls. We took up the beautiful, but worn, red carpet and refinished the mint condition white oak floors that lived underneath that carpet for years and years. We refinished the attractive woodwork that is found throughout the sanctuary. We still have carpet to put down at the Main Street entrances, the chancel area, and the two aisles on the ground floor of the sanctuary. It occurs to me that all of this work falls under the category of needed maintenance. In other words, it was time to devote some tender love and care to our sanctuary. No structural changes were needed be-

cause so many people love the sanctuary as it is; and our ancestors built it strong the first time (during the depression)!

Our capital campaign committee discussed the theology of the sanctuary. We wanted to balance the need for space to meet for worship with the cost of the project. We did not want to be too extravagant because we all know that God is not

moved by the color of the ceiling or the stain on the hardwood floors. Rather, God is moved by sincere worship. Nonetheless, God's people need a safe place to gather. And, just like the temple of old, our place of worship must be maintained through the years. Indeed, it is true that God is just as happy with sincere worship offered by 15 people gathered in someone's living room as God is with sincere worship offered in a packed medieval cathedral. However, in addition to our songs, prayers, meditations, and sermons, we offer to God in worship the beauty – in our case the simplistic beauty – of the space in which we gather.
