Resisting the Familiar in Favor of the Better

My thoughts have been upon the Israelites in the wilderness lately. It is a familiar narrative. Moses has confronted the Egyptian Pharoah with the Pharoah's oppression of the Israelite people. Finally, after a series of plagues, Pharoah agrees to let Moses and the people leave the bonds of slavery. However, Pharoah changes his mind. His army pursues Moses and the Israelites to the Red Sea. Moses raises his staff and God parts the waters of the sea. The Israelites pass through safely. When the Egyptian army attempts to pass through, the waters merge back together and the army drowns in the sea.

Now, the Israelites are on their way. They have escaped slavery under the Egyptians. They have a leader who will take them to the promised land – a land flowing with milk and honey, a land that was promised to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. However, they soon encounter problems – big problems. They are hungry and they are thirsty. So, they grumble against Moses. They say to Moses and Aaron, "Would that we had died by the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we sat by pots of meat, when we ate bread to the full; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger" (Exodus 16:3; see also Exodus 14:10-12 and Numbers 21:5).

As crazy as it looks and sounds, we humans do this a lot. We often return to the familiar – what we know. We do this even when, with hard work and discomfort, we could have a life that is much better, a life free of abuse or alcohol or overeating, or you name it. Thank God that ultimately the Israelites did not return to slavery under the Egyptians where at least they had bread and water. Rather, under the leadership of Moses, Joshua, and others, they eventually made their way through the wilderness and entered the promised land, the land of Israel.

On June 8th, I began to make people aware that I would like to jettison "Trey" in favor of my actual,

real, legal, birth certificate name - Paul. I knew this would be difficult to do at 50. Of course, I wish I had done this earlier. An ideal time would have been when we moved to the area in 2011. And so it is with Monday morning quarterbacking! This transition from "Trey" to Paul has been difficult as I expected. I did not expect, however, that some folks would be rude and sarcastic towards me. I understand the frustration but ... I have been tempted to do a Facebook post and say, "Forget it go back to calling me 'Trey'." However, deep down in my soul, I do not want to go back to the familiar. what I knew before, even though it would be so much easier. I will be grateful if I live 50 more years but the odds are against that. So, I suspect when I die, I will have been known as "Trey" for the majority of my life. Nonetheless, I want to get as much use out of Paul as I can going forward. Tempting though it has been, I do not wish to go back.

What about you? Do you need to resist the familiar in favor of the better? Are you tempted to return to slavery instead of enduring momentary difficulty and hardship – perhaps even ridicule? Let's follow the example of Moses and the Israelites. Let's fight through this temptation to return to the familiar and invest the necessary hard work to enter the promised land.
